

Marpole Neighbourhood House is located on the unceded, ancestral, and traditional homelands of the xwməθkwəýəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), and Səlílwəta?/Selilwitulh (Tsleil-Waututh) Nations.

We acknowledge and honour ćəsna?əm, one of the ancient village sites of the Musqueam people, located in what is now known as Marpole. For over 4,000 years, generations of Musqueam ancestors lived at ćəsna?əm, a place of deep cultural, spiritual, and historical significance. The site, also known as the Marpole Midden, is one of the largest pre-contact middens on the Pacific coast of Canada and was designated a National Historic Site in 1933

The Flow of Our Journey: A River of Relationships and Learning

As we reflect on the past 18 months, we see our program as a living river-flowing gently, guided by purpose, rooted in relationship. Like water, we move with the children, families, and communities who shape our path. At the heart of this river are our Educators, who walk gently beside each child, creating space for learning that is grounded in connection, care, and reciprocity.

In many Indigenous teachings, water is life. It teaches us to listen, to move with care, and to understand that all things are connected. This is how we approach our work—with gratitude for the children, families, and land that hold us.

At the river's source are the **Infants**, just beginning their journey. They are new to the world, learning first through the relationships that surround them. In this sacred beginning, we focus on nurturing secure, responsive connections. We work alongside families to create a warm and collaborative environment—one where each child is seen, heard, and honored.







Childcare



As children grow into the **Toddler** Program, the river widens. Toddlers begin to explore not only their relationships but also their place in the wider world. Guided by the principle of all my relations, we encourage children to see themselves as part of a larger circle—connected to the people, land, animals, and spirits around them. With families and Educators, they learn through shared experiences, guided by love and respect.

The river flows onward to our **3-5 Year Old Programs**, where children begin to understand who they are. This is a time of self-discovery and growing independence. We honor their voices, follow their curiosities, and support their learning through observation, reflection, and storytelling. Here, we gently scaffold their learning, respecting the wisdom they carry within themselves and the knowledge they build together.

Finally, the river reaches our **School Age Program**, where children deepen their understanding of their roles within the community and the world. They begin to ask: What do I bring? How can I contribute? In this space, we explore themes of justice, equity, and collective responsibility. We support children in seeing themselves as capable changemakers—grounded in empathy, empowered by knowledge, and guided by the values of respect, humility, and belonging.

Our river flows forward-with intention, with care, and always in relationship.

Programs Highlights





Seniors Central

Each week, 10–15 seniors join out-trips, workshops, and group sessions that keep them active, engaged, and socially connected. Through the Better at Home Program they've enjoyed visits to places like Lonsdale Quay Market, UBC Botanical Garden, and Steveston Village, plus a community book club at Mount Pleasant Library. These opportunities go beyond recreation, reducing isolation, fostering friendships, and enriching health, resilience, and quality of life.

Gathering Gardeners

A dedicated group of neighbours, led by Dianne, tends our garden each week-planting, weeding, harvesting, and collecting seeds for the Seed Library. This year they secured a Neighbourhood Small Grant to install a drip irrigation system and hosted a workshop teaching others how it works. The gardeners also joined MNH events like the Community Yard Sale, Open House, and BBQ, raising funds and awareness for community gardening while strengthening sustainability and connection.





Crochet and Knitting Group

This bustling, vibrant group is facilitated by the talented and creative Claire, who generously gives her time and resources to teach participants how to crochet and knit. Together, members have crafted and donated numerous handmade items—such as scarves, sweaters, hats, gloves, and blankets—to help raise funds for Marpole Neighbourhood House. The group has attracted many new members, fostered creativity, and built connections.




Youth Action Group

This year, the youth group planned and led community initiatives like assembling care packages for the MNH warming shelter and fundraising for local charities. They also joined workshops on civic engagement, résumé preparation, job readiness, and wellness, and completed a first aid course. Through these experiences and volunteering with the School's Out program, youth strengthened their leadership and interpersonal skills while gaining meaningful work experience to support their future goals.

United Way Schools Out Program

The United Way School's Out program engages children ages 5-12 in after-school activities that support learning, social development, and confidence. Participants explore their community, take part in creative projects, and build lasting friendships while discovering cultural activities that spark curiosity and dialogue. Youth staff guide and mentor participants, creating a safe, supportive space where young people can thrive and have fun.






Settlement Program

Our Settlement Services program helps newcomers, immigrants, and refugees navigate life in Marpole. We offer one-on-one support, referrals, and workshops on housing, employment, and community resources, fostering understanding and connection. 
